It isn't Mike's presentation that makes me mention him here. It's something he said later, after everyone had left and I was helping Mike break down his equipment and carry it to his car.

Mike told me that a large part of his job involved meeting with community groups such as ours. He jokingly said he spends a good deal of time talking to the "animal clubs" (the Elks, the Moose, the Lions...).

He then went on to compliment us. Mike sat through our whole meeting, and he said that he observed within CHPOA a community spirit and sense of volunteerism that he rarely sees

Red Dot Emergency Information Program

You're at home when illness or an accident occurs and you CALL 911. The Firefighters and Paramedics arrive and begin medical care for you. They also start asking you and/or your family members what seems to be a tremendous amount of questions. (What is your Medical History? What Medications do you take? How much? When? Do you have any Allergies?)

Emergency workers need this important information in order to treat you as quickly and effectively as possible. But can you remember everything during an emergency? What can you do?

Charlotte County Fire & EMS and Englewood Fire Department recognize this problem and that's why the Red Dot Program was created. This information is extremely helpful in medical emergencies and also when a call for assistance is made to law enforcement agencies.

This quick and easy Red Dot Medical Information Form is filled out before an emergency occurs. The top page of the form is then placed in a magnetic

pouch on the front of your refrigerator. The second page is mailed to 911 Dispatch for data entry.

At the time of an emergency, responders are alerted to this important information even before they arrive on the scene.

A 2-inch self-adhesive Reflective RED DOT is placed on your entry door, just above the door knob. The Red Dot and dispatchers will alert emergency workers that the Red Dot Medical Information Sheet is in the home on the front of the refrigerator.

The information sheet is transported with you to the hospital and copies are provided for the emergency room staff as well.

Englewood Community Hospital participates in this program and there is no charge for the Red Dot package.

Call or pick up your free Red Dot package at the Rotonda Fire Station, 403 Boundary Blvd. (697-6644) or the Englewood Headquarters, 599 S. Indiana Ave. (474-3311).

Englewood Fire Chief Visits Cape Haze

Chief Mike Bonakoske made a presentation at the January CHPOA meeting explaining an upcoming ballot question. The Englewood Area Fire Control District Board of Commissioners have placed the following referendum question on the March 9, 2004 ballot.

FIRE/RESCUE IMPROVEMENTS FOR ENGLEWOOD AREA FIRE CONTROL DISTRICT

“Shall the Englewood Area Fire Control District levy a one-half mill ad valorem tax for fiscal year 2004/2005 as authorized by Chapter 191, Florida Statutes, the Independent Special Fire Control Districts Act, in order to increase the level of life, safety and property protection for the citizens of the District and that the millage rate will not be more than one mill thereafter?”

Chief Bonakoske explained the millage would fund the following improvements to the fire department within five years:

- Increased training and equipment to handle bio-terrorism and hazardous material incidents
- Significantly reduce response times
- Double the number of firefighters on duty
- Build and staff three additional fire stations
- Improve ISO rating from 5/9 to 4 (Reduce fire insurance rates)

A commonly asked question is “what will it cost me?”.

On a home assessed at \$100,000 with a \$25,000 Homestead Property Tax Exemption, a 1/2 mil would cost an additional \$37.50 per year.

Stump Pass is not half closed already, even though a sandbar has formed on the south, inside of the pass. Changes in the recently dredged Pass are either a natural phenomenon or a sure sign that a lot of money was wasted on dredging – depends on who you talk to.

Local mariners say:

1. Years ago, when Stump Pass ran straight out, there was a lake on the south side and a sandy beach in the same place this sandbar is forming.

2. This is a natural deposit of sand brought on by the “flushing” of Lemon Bay.

3. Up and down the southwest coast of Florida all sandbars form on the southwest corners of the outlets.

Fishermen say the catches are better and that Lemon Bay is being revitalized by better flow with the Gulf. Beach-goers are enjoying the protected beach area. Navigation has not been effected by the changes.

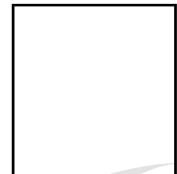
